

In this competition, students learn how to operate with EU regulations and international treaties that apply across different jurisdictions and should ideally receive a uniform interpretation.

## The Moot Court consists of two phases, a written and an oral one.

Teams are given a case geared towards Private International Law questions (jurisdiction, choice of law or recognition and enforcement issues), and students have the opportunity to learn and apply first-hand the complexities and nuances of how international conventions and EU Regulations interact in the context of transnational litigation.

In the oral phase, Moot teams plead before renowned judges, academics, and practicing lawyers in Private International Law.

The latest 2023 edition involved 28 teams in the oral rounds held in Antwerp with a total of 110 students coming from 12 EU and 5 non-EU states.
